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Message from the CEO

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well and embracing the many changes that autumn brings to Michigan. Vivid fall colors, fresh apple cider, and college football are just a few of the seasonal opportunities we can all enjoy this time of year.

Fall is also the time when our children return to school. For children with special needs, this can be a tumultuous experience when trying to meet classroom expectations around communication and behavior. Without the 60,000+ hours of therapies provided by DIC in schools each year, many of these students would lose valuable ground in their quest to reach their full potential.

The same can be said for our LEAP programs helping underserved children with special needs and their families. Taking place at a variety of locations during the summer, after school, and in homes year-round, LEAP will offer early interventions, developmental screenings, and academic support across Metro Detroit to more than 300 underserved children and families this year at no cost to them.

While we are extremely proud of our work, DIC's board and staff continue to focus on increasing our impact with even more children and families!

An important key to achieving this goal will be expanding our geographic "footprint" in under-resourced communities. One way we plan on doing this is by partnering with other agencies that work with those who will benefit from DIC's portfolio of services. Examples include homeless shelters housing families with young children and working alongside organizations with locations in underserved Detroit neighborhoods.

Another strategy involves expanding utilization of our Commerce Township Center. While schools are mandated to provide Individualized Education Plan (IEP) based services during the day, oftentimes these children would benefit greatly from additional therapy time. We hope to partner with schools in offering speech and occupational therapies after school and on weekends at our Commerce Center that directly complement a child's IEP treatment plan. We look forward to serving families with insurance, Medicaid, or on a private pay basis.

As the parent of a child who received services from DIC years ago, I am proud to be building on the work of those before me while also leading DIC forward. Together we have accomplished much, but there is still so much more to do if we are to realize our vision: Children with special needs and their families are all thriving members of the community.

I know the entire DIC Board joins me in thanking you, our donors, partners, and stakeholders, for your generous support that allows us to implement our programs. Why choose **After-School Programs?**



Academic Support

After-school programs can provide kids with special needs with the extra academic support they need to succeed in school. This can include help with homework, tutoring, and test self-regulation. These skills preparation. Additionally, they provide kids a safe and supportive environment where they can learn, grow, and have fun.



Social-Emotional Learning

After-school programs can also help kids with special needs develop important social and emotional skills, such as communication, conflict resolution, and help them build positive relationships with their peers and adults.



Increased Self-Confidence

After-school programs help kids build selfconfidence by providing them with opportunities to try new things and be recognized for their accomplishments. These programs can also develop can help them overcome resilience by teaching kids how to cope with setbacks and challenges.



Attendance and Achievement

Research has shown that kids with special needs who attend after-school programs are more likely to attend school regularly and achieve academically. This is because these programs challenges they may face in school and develop the skills they need to succeed.

DIC Back to School

School is back in session, and so is DIC's team of professionals who work with more than 2,000 students while providing more than 60,000 hours of speech, occupational, and behavioral therapy.

We currently partner with 192 K-12 schools, Head Starts, and Early Childhood programs across Detroit, Southeast, and West Michigan, with Detroit and Wayne County home to 150 of these locations. In addition, the sites where we work enroll 49% of Michigan's more than 200,000 special education students, with data also indicating 77% of students served are classified as "economically disadvantaged."

We also partner with agencies such as Inspire Autism to offer additional services, such as speech and occupational therapy, that can benefit their clients. The various therapies we provide address an array of needs associated with conditions such as Autism Spectrum Disorder, Speech Delay, and Sensory Processing Disorder. Because these conditions are not readily apparent to the naked eye, they are often considered to be "hidden disabilities" that, without appropriate intervention, will negatively impact a child's ability to reach their full potential in school and in life.

Now in its third year, DIC's Commerce Township Center continues to help children school-age and younger meet their speech and occupational therapy needs, with a specialization in working with children who have an Autism diagnosis.

DIC's team of professionals begins by conducting an independent assessment of a child's development across the entire spectrum of age-appropriate communication skills. If the child qualifies for special services by exhibiting a measurable delay in comparison to same-aged peers, one of our licensed and credentialed therapists will develop an individualized "game plan" designed specifically to meet that child's needs.

We are very pleased to serve families with insurance or on a private pay basis at our conveniently located Commerce location, and look forward to accepting Medicaid in the near future.
